Cold weather helps wheat crop

"How is the wheat?"

I have been getting that question a lot lately. Also, I've been asked, What do I do since my wheat has

These are questions that unfortunately don't have a definitive an-

As we all know, it's dry. Some wheat has not come up yet, and we all would like to see moisture on the ground instead of hearing how it's 'going to be a wet winter." No one knows how much moisture we will get this winter, but there are some things farmers may want to know when evaluating their wheat. One of the characteristics of win-

ter wheat is it requires a "vernalization" process, where the plant moves from vegetative growth to reproductive growth. Cold prompts vernalization. If winter wheat is planted in the spring, it would grow vegetatively, producing lots of leaves but no seed head. However, seed planted in dry soil

will not vernalize unless water enters the seed and it is imbibed with water. The seed will not look much different but the water basically 'wakes up" the seed to start growth. Rarely is vernalization a problem, except in an extremely dry year.

The next question is, did enough moisture accumulate through the last snowfall to initiate vernalization? All I can say is, it would depend on the location — on how much moisture actually accumulated at a given spot. There has been some moisture through spotty rains that may have caused the wheat to emerge. However, may not be able to see this from the road, as it may just be barely poking through.

The next question is how this delayed emergence will affect yield.

For this, we need to look at a couple moisture now than there was when of studies completed by K-State. First, a planting date study was run at Garden City over seven years Wheat planted Nov. 1 reached 77 percent of the yield potential of wheat planted on Oct. 1. The other planting dates reached the following percentage of the Oct. 1 planting: Dec. 1 - 59 percent; Jan. 1 - 57 percent, Feb. 1 - 41 percent; March 1 - 16 percent; and April 1 - never produced a seed head. The delayed planting decreased tiller number, which decreased the number of seed

In a study during the dry fall of 1999 in north central Kansas, farmers who had spotty emergence in their fields were contacted to compare the yield of wheat that emerged in the fall versus wheat which emerged in the spring. The study took place in several counties across Kansas, including Norton. Results showed spring-emerged wheat reduced grain yield by 47 percent. Test weight, kernel diameter, and thousand-kernel weight were all lower in the spring-

The last question has to do with the wheat stand. Producers may be thinking of replanting their wheat. However, I would caution against

they first planted, so why would anyone expect a better stand?

If a farmer wants to increase the number of seeds out there to increase seed head number, since tiller number will likely be lower, he could overseed any existing stand by planting at an angle to the existing rows. On some fields planted at a low seeding rate, this

might help. Farmers need to be patient and realize that with a little bit of moisture, wheat will vernalize and produce a seed head even though there may be reduced potential for high
