Quilt display set at Logan

Two quilt displays are coming to the Dane G. Hansen Memorial Museum in Logan this January. Both will open on Jan. 9 and continue on display through Feb. 22. A unique quilt exhibition,

"Oxymorons: Absurdly Logical Quilts" includes 40 unusual quilts based upon and interpreting, an oxymoron — a two-word phrase of seemingly contradictory words. They are definitely not what grandmothers would consider a quilt, but instead represent a new level in fabric art.

To commemorate the exhibit, the American Quilters Society has also published a book, "Oxymorons: Absurdly Logical Quilts," showcasing the exhibit's quilts and their makers. "Pieces of the Past" will bring

little quilts to the museum in a big way. Approximately 100 doll quilts and 50 doll beds from the Ghormley private collection will be on display during this time.

Ghormley is one of the founding members of the Lincoln Quilter's Guild. Her collection dates back to the mid 1800s.
