Man charged with murder held on \$1 million bond

Sherman County District Court late last Monday against Lanny Bevington, 33, in the shooting death of his wife Kerrie early last Sunday.

Sherman County Sheriff Doug Whitson said Mr. Bevington was charged with first- degree murder after an investigation by the KBI and sheriff deputies which included an autopsy in Topeka last Monday.

Mr. Bevington is being held on \$1 million bond, and his first appearance in district court was Wednesday, when an attorney was appointed to represent him and the David Bowman of Brewster. judge continued the bond.

Calvin Williams, a Colby lawyer, was appointed. A preliminary hearing was scheduled for 9 a.m. on Thursday.

Mr. Bevington was brought over to the courthouse by sheriff's deputies and a jailer at 9:30 a.m. He kept his head down on the way in and covered his face with papers on the way back to the Sherman County Bastille to avoid being photo-

When he entered the courtroom, he was given paperwork to fill out about his financial situation to determine eligibility for a court-appointed attorney.

VanGogh pins to go on sale

The 80-foot easel with the 24x32foot reproduction of a Van Gogh sunflower painting was erected in Goodland in April 2001, but that is where the project seemed to stop.

Now, the Sherman County Convention and Visitors Bureau has developed the first promotional item — a special color lapel pin — that will be available for sale in the next week or two.

The Van Gogh sunflower replica was painted by Canadian artist Cameron Cross as part of a project to highlight the importance of sunflowers in Sherman County and around the world.

Sunflowers USA, a local nonprofit group, raised money for the painting and the 80-foot easel that stands facing I-70 on east of Cherry Ave, and north of Business U.S. 24.

Donna Price, executive director of the bureau, and Dale Neill, president of its board, displayed the first of the new pins in their office last Monday. They said they were working out details to be able to begin selling them this month.

The pins have a replica of the Van Gogh painting on the easel with the words Goodland, Kansas, on the bottom. There is a blue sky background and the pin is edged in gold. The outline seems to resemble a large cloud.

Ms. Price and Mr. Neill said they have been working with both the Sunflowers USA people and the artist to get permission to sell the pin vision." and other Van Gogh products in the

"We felt like this needed to be done," Mrs. Neill said. "We discussed it at the last board meeting to go ahead with the pins."

He said he hopes businesses will want to sell the pins to help promote the painting and Goodland.
