City council asks foreman to get bids

The Oberlin City Council asked the city foreman to get bids for a new or used air compressor for the crew.

Foreman Dan Castle said possibly the best way to go about buying a compressor is at an auction. He said there can be a \$4,000 to \$5,000 difference between new and used machines, and a new air compressor can run \$12,000 to \$13,000.

Mayor Ken Shobe asked if the compressor was in the budget. No, said Mr. Castle, but the city doesn't want it to break down. The city has a 1984 model which it purchased in 1990 or 1991.

Councilman Ray Ward said he would like to get bids on new ones and a reconditioned one. The auction may be the cheapest way to go, he said, but it could be a real gamble.

The council also asked for bids on a pickup for the street department and a utility vehicle for the cemetery that can be used to carry a sprayer.

The council held five and 20-minute closed sessions for personnel, after which the council approved raises for city employees based on the person and his or her work. The biggest raise was \$1 an

hour with some employees not receiving a raise at all. Most of the raises were 25 cents an hour.

In other business, the council:

- Appointed school Superintendent Kelly Glodt to the Economic Development Corp. board, banker Jesse Carter to the planning commission and board of zoning appeals, Mary Jo Lohofener, who works at Financial Consulting and Investigation and Councilman Patrick Pomeroy to the minimum housing standards board and Councilman Joe Stanley, Realtor Carolyn Burtis, Business Owner Gary Anderson and Museum Curator Sharleen Wurm to the convention and visitors bureau.
- Held a five-minute closed session for attorney client privilege.
- Talked with Police Chief Wade Lockhart about the two video cameras he needs. He said he found two at Sears in McCook.

He attended Washburn University. He was employed with family-owned newspapers in Peabody and Goodland, and commercial printing in Topeka.

He married Dorothy A. VanOrman at her mother's home in Topeka. She preceded him in death on Feb. 21, 1993.

After employment in Laramie, Wyo., the family moved to Oberlin, where he was a Linotype operator and machinist. He moved to Norton and worked for the Norton paper. In July, 1942, the family moved to Hastings, Neb., where he was employed with the *Hastings Daily Tribune* from July 5, 1942, until his retirement on Jan. 2, 1971. He was Linotype machinist and Mechanical Superintendent from 1948 until retirement.

He and his wife moved to the Good Samaritan Village in 1980. Later he moved to Kensington, where he was involved in music, playing the violin, trumpet, organ and singing. The couple celebrated their 50th and 60th wedding anniversaries at First United Methodist Church.

He was a member of the First United Methodist Church, where he was a member of the Brass Choir; Golden Age Entertainers; charter member of the Maverick Band; a 50-year member of Mid-West Masonic Lodge; Tehama Shrine; past member of Toastmasters and charter

member and first president of the Hastings Amateur Radio Club and past civil defense director for Adams County, Neb.
