Enjoy a walk across Kansas

Local residents are signing up to participate in the continuing Walk Kansas program right now.

Walk Kansas is a health and fitness program offered by Kansas State University Research and Extension in cooperation with the Family Nutrition Program.

The program targets people who enjoy exercise as well as those who may not have exercised previously.

The program goal is to log enough mileage (at least 423 miles) to cross Kansas, from the combined efforts of a six-member team.

Everyday activities, like walking in your neighborhood, gardening or choosing the stairs instead of the elevator can count. The amount of physical activity should be equivalent to the energy expended during 15 minutes of walking, which equals one mile for Walk Kansas purposes.

Adding 30 or more minutes of exercise daily can reduce anxiety and depression, improve mood, and make losing weight — or maintaining a healthy weight — easier.

"Walk Kansas" invites your participation as a team-member. The goal is to encourage physical activity that contributes to health. Teams may include friends, neighbors or co-workers who know each other, or people who don't.
