Brown sugar is a staple ingredient in many kitchens. It is used in cookies, cakes and pastries to add a caramel, spicy flavor as well as moisture. It is also used in baked beans, minced meat and plum pudding

The difference? Brown sugar contains molasses. Originally, brown sugar was made from semirefined sugar that contained natural molasses.

Now, white sugar is blended with molasses in different amounts and types to make various grades of brown sugar. The grades are known as 6, 8, 10, and 13. Higher grades have darker color and stronger fla-



doing so will result in inaccurate measuring.

Dark brown and light brown sugars are interchangeable, although dark brown sugar will add a deeper, spicier flavor.

If you run out, make your own by When measuring, always pack it combining 1 cup white sugar and 3-

firmly into the measuring cup. Not 4 tablespoons molasses in a food processor. Pulse to blend.

> To prevent drying out and hardening, store in an airtight container or resealable plastic bag.

> Soften by placing a slice of bread or moist paper towel in the container for several hours, or heat in the microwave 15-20 seconds.


