Emergency loans offered

Farmers in Phillips, Norton, Decatur and Rawlins counties who suffered crop losses because of severe drought last year may apply for Farm Service Agency emergency loans

"Loans covering physical and/or production losses may be made at 3.75 percent interest rate," said John C. Vogt, farm loan manager. "They are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible, consistent with the applicant's reasonable ability to pay," he said.

Loans covering physical losses lections, including secular, pop and may be used to replace installations, equipment, livestock or buildings (including homes) lost through this disaster. The money may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, to make payments on real estate and chattel debts, or for essential operating and living expenses To be eligible, an applicant must be operating a family-size farm or ranch and unable to get credit elsewhere. Farmers who suffered at least a 30 percent reduction to at least one crop may have a qualifying loss. Emergency loans cover up to 100 percent of qualifying losses up to \$500,000, less the outstanding principal balance of prior emergency loans. Farmers can make applications at the Farm Service office in Norton. 113 N. Norton Ave., between 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday through Fridav




