A fire early Saturday morning burned the Hollister and Johnson Bros. Implement building, the W. A. Cook Billard Hall and the H. D. Colvin office building. The Hollister & Johnson building was a 3-story brick veneer structure erected in 1886 and occupied by the Commercial Hotel for a number of years. The fire company could do little to save the building and only by the hardest kind of effort kept the Griffith and Acton livery barn, the Herald office and the W. A. Dale carpenter shop from




