Soybeansmay beagood gamble

Soybean production is speculative on dryland acres, but with the price of beans rising, less is needed to make the gamble pay off.

Remember, do not plant soybeans in fields treated with atrazine this spring or last fall. There are good weed control options on this crop, but there is widespread resistance to some herbicides, so know your weeds before application.

If a field exhibited resistance to a certain family of herbicides a couple of years ago, the resistance is still present. Many farmers will use a glyphosate product on Roundup Ready soybeans. I would encourage using a preemergence herbicide to complement the gly-

Plant 100,000 to 130,000 seeds per acre, at a depth of 1 to 1.5 inches. Make sure the seeds are inoculated with the bacterium soybeans need to produce their own nitrogen.

A starter application of 20 pounds of nitrogen per acre will allow good early establishment and growth of seedlings until the plant has a chance to start making its own. Other nutrients soybeans respond to include phosphorus, potassium, zinc, and iron.

Soybeans or sunflowers. These crops share some of the same pests such as the soybean stem borer (also known as the long-horned beetle), which will girdle the inside of the soybean stem, causing it to lodge, or fall over, close to maturity.


