## Art work featured at Colby

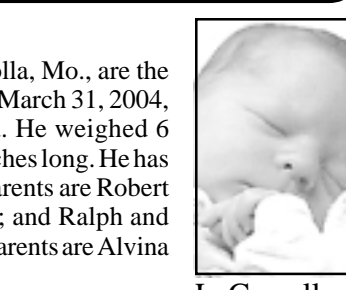
Mary Ewing, a textile artist of Cedar Bluffs, is the featured artist at the Colby Community College Gallery through Friday. The gallery is open Monday
