75 YEARS AGO — April 1929

Three auto loads of Oberlin people left last Wednesday morning en route to Manhattan to attend the Rotary Convention. Rain followed us all the way down and back as well and we learned that a properly graded and graveled highway can be driven over regardless of rain and mud, but dirt roads are impassable under conditions such as existed Friday and Saturday.

The closing banquet of the convention was held in Nichols Gymnasium with places set for over a 1,000. Harry Brewer, formerly of Dresden, was in charge of the transportation committee who provided automobiles for all visiting Rotarians on all occasions.

The Sixth District American Legion and Legion Auxiliary convention held in Oberlin April 21 and 22 was well attended. A light rain began to fall before the big parade started down Penn Avenue and doubtless kept a few persons at home. The American Legion had done a good job of decorating Penn Avenue for the convention.
