75 YEARS AGO — May 1929

To give Oberlin people an idea what Nebraska is doing in road building, Dr. H. J. Morrison and the highway committee of the Oberlin Commercial Club worked up a group trip to North Platte Sunday. This writer has lived in Oberlin since 1884 but had never been north of the McCook fairgrounds. Part of the road is graveled, part only graded and there are steep bluffs and canyons and later gently rolling sandy hills. After lunch at the Union Pacific dining room, we visited the famous Cody Ranch northwest of North Platte, the U.S. Mail aviation field and made a brief stop at the experiment station south of the city 3 miles where a grand view up and down the Platte can be had from the bluff.
