

The referendum will be conducted at the county Farm Service Agency office. To be eligible, farmers must certify and provide documentation that shows that they produced soybeans and paid an assessment on the crop during the period of Jan. 1, 2002 through Dec. 31, 2003. Only those producers who desire a referendum on the order will participate.

From now through May 28, farmers may obtain a form to request a referendum from the county office either in person, by mail or by fax. Forms may also be obtained via the Internet at <a href="http://www.ams.usda-">http://www.ams.usda-</a> .gov/lsg/mpb/rp-soy.htm.

Individual producers and other producer entities may request a referendum at the county Farm Service Agency office where their administrative farm records are maintained. For the producer not participating in Farm Service Agency programs, the opportunity to request a referendum will be provided at the county office where the producer owns or rents
