

Sheriff applies for grants

The Decatur County sheriff has applied for two grants, one for automated heart defibrillators and another for Tasers and surveillance equipment.

Sheriff Ken Badsky told commissioners about the grants at their meeting on May 4.

The first grant through Cintas is jail from Red Willow County and for three automated defibrillators. Sheriff Badsky said the equipment runs about \$4,000 apiece. He said the grant also provides training.

The second grant is through Edward Byrne for tasers and surveillance equipment.

Sheriff Badsky said he and Undersheriff Michael French talked about applying for a "Cops in School" grant, but the deadline was Tuesday, so they decided not to.
