Theme will be "Spring Crop Alternatives in Cropping Systems." Registration will begin at 8:30 a.m., followed by the welcome and introductions by Pat Coyne, head of Western Kansas Agriculture Research Centers.

The program begins at 9 a.m. when Agronomist Charlie Rife talks about canola performance. Wheat performance in dryland rotations and irrigation timing will be the topic of Rob Aiken's talk on crop science at 9:25 a.m. Other morning presentations will include informa-

tion on spring forage crops by Keith Harmony, from the Ag Research Center at Hays; stripe rust and pathogens by James Stack, plant pathologist; and weed shift in Roundup Ready dryland rotations by Phil Stahlman, from the weed science department of the Ag Research Center in Hays.

Breakout sessions are scheduled at 11 a.m., 11:20 a.m. and 11:40 a.m. They will include information on multi-peril crop insurance by Virgil Jones and Randy Wilson; army cutworm/Russian wheat aphid by J.P. Michaud; no-till wheat plots by Roger Stockton; Proso millet by Rob Aiken; erosion control/ground cover by Simon van Donk; supple-

mentation on pasture by Keith Harmony; weed seedling identification by Brian Olson; and no-till crop planter adjustments and attachments by Randy Taylor. Lunch will follow at noon.

Keynote speaker at 1 p.m. will be Dr. Merle Vigil, representing no-till cropping research at the ARS Central Great Plains Research Station at Akron, Colo.
