

Superintendent Kelly Glodt said at a meeting Monday, May 10, that if the distrcit entered the program, the name would change from developmental kindergarten to integrated preschool.

The district's developmental kindergarten is for students who are not quite ready for kindergarten. Integrated preschool is for those same students, but also includes classes for 3- and 4 year olds who don't qualify for Head Start.

If the district goes with integrated preschool, he said, 3- and 4-yearolds will go in the morning and the 5-year-olds in the afternoon.
