'Pots and Pans Living'

St. Teresa of Avila was a nun who lived in the 16th century. She had a very deep spirituality and was devoted to the contemplative life. A quote attributed to her got me thinking about churches and service. She said, "Christ moves among the pots and pans." I believe that is so true.

St. Teresa's "pots and pans" speak to me about servanthood. Christ surely exhibited this kind of servanthood in his own life. Jesus didn't cook for anybody, but in other ways he served others when he healed, performed miracles and gave of his time and energy to those who followed him. But the ultimate example of his servanthood took place the night before he died. Jesus gathered his twelve disciples together to celebrate the Passover. Before the meal, Jesus knelt before them and washed their feet. A teacher never washed the feet of his followers. It just wasn't done. Only servants did that kind of service. Yet, Jesus wanted to model servanthood for these twelve, so he knelt before them, held their really, isn't that what the church is all about?

dirty feet in his hands and washed them.

We don't have much opportunity to wash one another's feet nowadays, but there are plenty of ways in which we can serve each other in the church. I have seen this firsthand in our own church. One of the best examples of servanthood is how our people respond to a death in the congregation. People bring meals to the family.

But I find that most of the servant behavior happens the day of the funeral. Usually we have a meal following the funeral at our church. Our women literally use Christ's pots and pans by preparing a meal for the family. Others help in setting up the church for the funeral or help to clean up following the funeral and meal.

Such acts of servanthood are not limited to funerals, however. In many other ways we help those in need in our congregation.

And so in each act of servanthood, we become "Christ among the pots and pans" to each other. And
