Decatur County walkers total 7,944 miles An eight-week health and fitness

program, "Walk Kansas," has just been completed in Decatur County. The program, sponsored by the Decatur County office of K-State

Research and Extension, was open to adults and children 5 and older. Seventy-two Decatur County residents on 12 teams of six participated in this second year. To date, team members have reported walking a total of 7,944 miles.

The goal of Walk Kansas is to encourage 30 minutes or more of moderate intensity aerobic exercise five or more days a week. Walking is encouraged as a form of exercise most people can do.

Miles or minutes of exercise were logged as teams of six people tried to accumulate 423 miles to "walk" across Kansas. Ten of the 12 teams walked all the way across Kansas and part-way back.

The Decatur County team turning in the most miles was the Energizers, with a combined total of 1,181 miles in eight weeks. Members were Jody Shike (team captain), Denise Abbey, Jeanette Diederich, Sam Gotchall, Carol Morford and Matthew Wittman.

Wittman turned in the most miles walked by one person, 256 during the eight-week program. He was followed by Ruth Wolfram of the WALKERS and Dana Marintzer of the Jay Walkers, who both walked
