Ross Van Pelt

Ross Van Pelt, 75, a retired farmer and World War II veteran, died Sunday, June 20, 2004, at the Decatur County Hospital in Oberlin.

He was born Aug. 16, 1928, in Kansas City, Mo., the son of Will and Myrtle (Fowler) Van Pelt. He was reared on a farm in Decatur County and attended country school. He graduated from Decatur Community High School in 1946. He served in the U.S. Army during World War II, where he was a corporal.

He married Dorothy Ann Ruby on Sept. 26, 1948, at Danbury. They lived at Danbury until 1949, when they moved to a farm northeast of Oberlin. They moved to Oberlin in 1984. He was a lifetime member of the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars and served over 20 years as Sergeant-at-Arms.

Survivors include his wife, Dorothy, Oberlin; a son, Wesley James Van Pelt, Lafayette, Colo.; three daughters, Billie Jo Rubinfeld, Lancaster, Calif.; Maria and Gary Wonzniak, Colby; and Barbara

Tally, Oberlin; and eight grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Will and Myrtle Van Pelt, and his step-father, Ivan Cochran.

Graveside services will be held at 10:30 a.m. Friday at the Oberlin Cemetery with the Rev. Mike McVay officiating.

A memorial was established to the Oberlin American Legion military funeral detail. Contributions may be left at Pauls Funeral Home, 121 N. Penn, Oberlin, Kan., 67749. There is no visitation.
