School board hears plan for science class

week told two high school science teachers to work with the curriculum committee to add another science class because graduation requirements are changing.

Teachers Caleb Howland and Mark Bricker met with the board to go over the idea of a general science Mr. Howland isn't certified to teach class which would be offered starting a year from now.

Decatur Community High Principal Charles Haag said the class of 2009 will need three sciences and three math courses to graduate. He said most college-bound students already take three science courses, but those kids who don't go to college don't normally take all three.

The idea of the new science class is to give those students not going onto college a third option, he said.

Mr. Howland said there would be two tracks then. The first one would include the new class at the beginning, then biology 1 and physical science. That would be for students not as strong in the subject.

Then second would be the way most students go now, the college prep track, which is biology 1, physical science and chemistry.

General science would get the students ready for the next science, said Mr. Howland, while also is giving them some earth/space science, which currently isn't taught at the

He said he and Mr. Bricker wanted permission to go look at textbooks and start getting a curricu-

Oberlin Elementary Principal Duane Dorshorst said the idea needs to go to the curriculum committee. He said the state Board of Regents all students need the three sciences, but general science won't count. It

The Oberlin School Board last has to be a specific area. If the class is going to be heavy on earth science, he asked, why not just teach that?

Has the district had an earth science class in the past? asked Superintendent Kelly Glodt. Mr. Bricker said he taught one, but doesn't now because he has a full schedule and

Mr. Haag said Randy Olson could teach the general science class, but it wouldn't count for Regents requirements. The other problem is that students take the state assessments at the beginning of their sophomore year, he said, and may not know what they need with only taking a general science class.

Are the students prepared for biology 1? asked Mr. Glodt. Mr. Howland said there are eight to 10 kids each year who struggle with the class. Then there are around six who are at the other end.

Maybe general science isn't the right class, said Mr. Haag, but there needs to be something and maybe something that prepares the students

If science is put on the curriculum committee schedule, would there be time to get a class going next year? asked Board Member Dewayne

If the class is added on in the junior year, then there are really three years for that to be done, said Mr. Haag. This year the committee will be doing reading and a few other minor things, said Mr. Dorshorst.

Mr. Haag said it may only be eight or 10 kids who need the class at the
