County tables decision

Sheriff vehicle on hold for bids

Decatur County commissioners decided last Tuesday to table a decision on a new vehicle for the sheriff's office until an opinion is received back from the state attorney general about whether the county has to buy from a Kansas dealer.

Last month, Sheriff Ken Badsky and Undersheriff Michael French brought commissioners a bid for a Dodge Durango in Illinois for \$22,900.

The week after that, County Attorney Steve Hirsch had a copy of the letter sent from the Kansas League of Municipalities stating that municipalities can't purchase vehicles from dealers who are not licensed to sell in Kansas.

Last Tuesday, Sheriff Badsky and Undersheriff French were back with bids for vehicles listed with area dealers. There were six:

• Faw's Garage in Arapahoe for a 2004 Dodge Durango for \$25,340. • Wagner Ford in McCook for a 2004 Ford Expedition for \$30,731. • Oakley Motors in Oakley for a 2004 Dodge Durango for \$31,670

less a \$3,500 mail in rebate. Matteson Motors in Phillipsburg for a 2004 Dodge Durango for

\$34,785 less the \$5,500 rebate. • Herl Chevrolet-Buick in Goodland for a 2005 Chevy Tahoe for

\$31.626. • Tubbs and Sons Ford in Colby for a 2005 Ford Expedition for \$26.806.


A call was made to Faw's, the lowest bidder, and they don't have a Kansas license.

With the bid, the men asked about stripping the equipment out of the 1997 Expedition the department owns and trading it in to OMB Police Supply out of Dodge City to get \$5,000 worth of credit for equipment from the company. Undersheriff French asked if they could do that since it can't be put off.

Commissioner Patricia Glenn said she wasn't in favor of doing things for credit.

Crew seals streets with sand and goo

Crews started pouring black stuff on Oberlin streets, then covering the smelly, sticky goo with sand.

East/west streets were sealed this year. City Administrator Gary Shike said the city sends out bid packets each year, and B&H Paving out of Scott City has been the only company reply for years. Most companies like to work on a bigger job, he said.

The crew brought in sand some time ago and stored it on Martin before but not for years. The company has used the state mixing to do the east/west streets again. strips outside of town, but these were already in use this year.

The sealing extends the life of the streets, he said. The asphalt surface gets dry, hard and brittle and starts to crack. The crew sprays the oil on the streets and then covers it with sand, said Mr. Shike. The new oil softens the pavement, and then sand works its way in and then renews the wear surface.

The whole process costs around \$43,000, which is what it would cost to repave just one block.

Television service would be free to city

The Oberlin police chief told the City Council at the meeting Thursday, July 1, about a television network that offers free televised training for officers which could save the city money.

Chief Police Wade Lockhart said Sen. Sam Brownback had helped get the system hooked up in the state of Kansas free for a year. City Attorney Steve Hirsch said the training usually costs around \$3,000 a year.

The classes are on television through satellite, the chief said. He said he and the officers can use some of them to satisfy their yearly training requirement. Mr. Hirsch said he uses three of the systems in Hoxie to do training for the firemen.

ChiefLockhart said he would like to invest in a DVD recorder so they can record the classes and then watch them later.

Is it just for training? asked Councilman Jay Anderson. No, said Chief Lockhart. They can also learn about homeland security and other things on the secure network.

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
