Technology field trips planned

Farmers have two chances to see the latest agricultural technology on Tuesday, Aug. 10.

Unfortunately, due to scheduling conflicts, the two field days are on the same day, so farmers will have to choose which to attend. One will feature precision agriculture technologies while the second will be on sub-surface drip irrigation.

The field day on precision agriculture, Agriculture Technology Field Day, will help farmers and others learn about new ag technology innovations. K-State Research and Extension is teaming up with the Kansas Agricultural Research Association and several suppliers to sponsor this event in Salina.

The field day will run from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the East Crawford Recreation Area on Markley Road, between Crawford Street and Magnolia Road.

'Participants will have a chance to learn from individuals who developed, evaluated and used the technologies," said Randy Taylor, K-State ag engineer. "This field day is for anyone currently using or thinking about using precision agriculture technologies on their farm."

A demonstration area will give producers a chance to operate some of the premier guidance systems available on the market. Many of


