Insects are becoming problem

With improved conditions, crops have taken off over the past couple of weeks, but as potential yield for a crop increases, so does potential loss from insects.

With many farmers growing broadleaf crops they are not as familiar with, such as soybeans and sunflowers, a review of some important pests in these crops is in

Major pests in soybeans include corn earworm, green cloverworm and soybean stem borer. Corn earworm will feed on immature soybean pods. Scouting should start when soybeans start to bloom. Green cloverworms are light

green with three pairs of legs near the head, three pairs of fleshy legs in the middle, and one more at the end. Larvae chew holes in leaves from July through September. Soybean stem borer can cause

significant loss through girdling the inside of the soybean stem. Strong winds will then cause these plants to lodge. Eggs are laid by mature soybean stem borer beetles on the midcanopy leaf petioles. Control options along with

thresholds can be found in the K-State publication "Soybean Insect Management 2004." In addition, farmers should keep

their eyes open for soybean aphids. In the past this wasn't a problem. However, starting in summer of 2000, colonies were found in the Midwest. In 2003, 17 eastern Kansas counties had confirmed reports.

These aphids are distinguished by small, greenish-yellow bodies with black tailpipes. No significant damage has been reported in Kansas, but K-State wants to track their progression. Please let me know if you come across them in your field by calling (785) 443-1264.

As for sunflowers, important pests include stem weevils and sunflower head moths. There are actually two types of stem weevils, one being gray-brown with white spots and 3/16 of inch in length, while the other is black and 1/10 inch long. These weevils insert larva into the sunflower stalk between the V8 to V10 stage. Significant yield loss occurs with 25 or more larvae per stem, but the only time to control them is by controlling the mature

Sunflower head moths lay larva on maturing sunflower heads. As the larva feed, they introduce rhizopus head rot, which causes significant yield losses. Scouting and control measures should be started just tension office, 475-8121. as the sunflower head starts open-

Planning ahead to have the field sprayed by an aerial applicator is important. Typically, applications occurs later than the R4 to R5.1 growth stage, and thus damage has already occurred. Control options along with thresholds can be found in the K-State publication "Sunflower Insect Management 2004."

Although grasshoppers have enough food in ditches and pastures with recent rains, if conditions become dry again and plant growth decreases, many large grasshoppers will be looking for a meal. Any crop will be vulnerable, so monitor your field edges.

We were at a pottery place once and the potter was at the wheel. We could stand and watch beautiful vessel, ready to be used by the Master.


through a glass as he threw clay on his wheel. It looked ugly, like a lump of mud, but as he began
