

County waiting on new vehicle bids

Decatur County sheriff's officers and commissioners are waiting for another round of bids before making any decisions on purchasing a new vehicle for the department.

Wednesday, July 21, 2004

Sheriff Ken Badsky talked with the commissioners last Tuesday to let them know that more bids should be in by the last meeting in July.

He said the dealer in Illinois that bid the Dodge Durango for \$22,900 is a pilot program for dealers to sell vehicles. That is the wholesale price to the dealer or to the department, he said. The dealer is not licensed in Kansas, however.

Sheriff Badsky said he also placed an ad in The Oberlin Herald for sealed bids on the Ford Expedition the department would like to sell.

The department recently received a Byrne grant for a little over \$20,000, with the county having to come up with a 25 percent match. hicle inspections, five accidents,

Sheriff Badsky said he has ordered four Tasers with the money. The total price for the equipment is

\$2,237. In order for the officers to carry the tasers, he said, they have to be shot with them to see how it feels. Sheriff Badsky said they will carry them on their belts on the opposite side of their guns.

With the grant, he said, he has to send in documentation every 30 days of what the department has spent.


Commissioner Ralph Unger said they would take the information and put it with the other requests, and
