of Atwood placed first and second in the "Bottom Line Profitability" category at the Commercial Cowherd Improvement Program 2003-2004 test

The cattle operation in southwest Rawlins county is operated by Kevin and Lyle Dixson of Atwood and Carol Dixson of Oberlin. They specialize in producing Simmental, SimAngus, and Red Angus seedstock. Carol teaches sixth grade in Oberlin. Their parents are the late Don and LaVay (Huntley) Dixson.

The test, conducted by the Guaranty State Bank of Beloit, is managed by Solomon County Feeders and the National Cattleman's Beef Association. This marks the 30th continuous year of comprehensive testing of performance and carcass traits, with over 3,700 steers of all beef breeds being tested.

The top entry was a 1,390-pound steer that gained 4.37 pounds per

Steers entered by Dixson Farms day. When harvested, he hung a choice yield Grade 1 carcass. Both of the top two steers were gray purebred Simmentals that exceeded the group average profitability by \$265.69 and \$262.97. This is the second consecutive year that a Dixson Farms steer has topped this test, the owners said.
