#### Loan deadline is Sept. 23

The deadline for applications for may be used to replace installations. emergency disaster loans by farmers in Rawlins, Decatur, Norton and Phillips counties is Thursday, Sept.

John C. Vogt, farm loan manager for the U.S. Farm Service Agency, said that operators needing farm credit as a result of drought, wind and insect infestation since Jan. 1, 2003, should apply at the Norton County Farm Service Agency office, 113 N. Norton.

"Loans covering physical and/or production losses may be made at 3.75 percent interest rate, and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible, consistent with the applicant's reasonable ability to pay," he said.

Loans covering physical losses less.

equipment, livestock, or buildings (including) homes), lost through this disaster. They may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer or livestock, or make payments on real estate and chattel debts.

'Funds can also be used for other essential operating and living expenses," Mr. Vogt said.


An applicant must be operating a family-size farm or ranch, be unable to get credit elsewhere, and have suffered a qualifying physical and/ or production loss from the disaster.

Farmers who suffered at least a 30 percent reduction to at least one crop may have a qualifying loss. Loans cover up to 80 percent of qualifying losses, or \$500,000, whichever is
