

The rains that passed through the area were definitely a blessing. Most fields got at least 1.5 inches of

rain or more. Now, the wheat will get off to a good start with sufficient moisture.

The only problem is that the moisture will likely delay wheat planting past the optimum date of Sept. 30 for most of the area, with the exception of Trego County, which is around mid-October.

Farmers may want to bump up their seeding rates by 10 to 20 pounds per acre if they are delayed by more than two to three weeks. The increase in seeding will compensate for a lower tiller number from the later planting date and an earlier than normal date when the wheat becomes dormant. Farmers should definitely increase the seeding rate if they are a month or more behind schedule.

When planting wheat late, it is always better to plant too much than not enough because it is difficult to predict what the weather is going to do. By planting heavier, there is less need to rely on wheat tiller development, which is primarily formed in the fall, although most growth occurs in the spring.

For fields already planted, there is a potential that furrow rows could have washed in and inhibited germination because the wheat is buried under more than two to three inches of soil. Therefore, some farmers may have to replant their wheat. The decision whether to replant should be made field by field.

Jim Shroyer, K-State wheat specialist, says if a grower planted 60 pounds of seed per acre using 7-inch rows under normal growing condi-
