

The idea for the club began during World War II, when there was little entertainment for homemakers in rural communities. Marie (Chilson)Brown telephoned neighboring women southwest of Oberlin in the Sappa and Bassettville townships and invited them to her home. It was during that social afternoon that she suggested starting a neighborhood club.

The women chose the name "Calico Gals" and decided to meet the third Wednesday of each month. which has continued over the years. Dues were originally 50 cents a year, but are now \$5. At first, each hostess chose a project, usually mending, quilting, patching or embroidery. In later years, the women took their own work or enjoyed outings around the area which even included a swimming party in Atwood.

Children who accompanied their mothers looked forward to getting together to play and members agree that the club has done much to hold the community together.

Over the years, they have enjoyed working together at farm sales, holding Halloween masquerade parties, as well as making streudel, carving pumpkins, making beaded Christmas ornaments, and decorating Easter eggs. They have toured the greenhouses and Frank Lloyd Wright house in McCook and quilt displays at the Dane Hansen Museum in Logan.

We no longer elect officers, but instead members volunteer. We can always count on members to be there in good times, as well as in times of trouble."
