## Dogs may be banned

The Oberlin City Council heard a complaint Thursday about pet owners who don't pick up after their dogs in City Park.

Councilman Jay Anderson asked if there was anything the council could do about the dogs in the park.

Police Chief Wade Lockhart said it is the responsibility of the owner to pick up dog leavings. The city has a leash ordinance that covers the situation, he said. If the city was going to post something, he added, it should be "No dogs in the park."

With tapeworms and other things, said Dr. Anderson, dog feces is a public health issue.

Councilman Joe Stanley said he has heard comments from school employees that dog feces was getting into the school on shoes.

There are those people who follow the law and pick up the feces, said Mayor Ken Shobe, so basically that would mean they would have to walk their dogs in the street. The park can't be patrolled for dogs 24 hours a day, he noted.

There are other areas to exercise a dog, said Dr. Anderson. The only way to control the problem is make the park a no-dog area.

That is one councilman's opinion, said Mayor Shobe, but it is something to think about.

Dr. Anderson said he would like public comment.

Is it dogs on leashes that are causing the problem, asked Councilman Stan McEvoy, or is it the ones running loose?

Dr. Anderson asked if the police would be interested in doing a two week survey on the park to see which dogs are causing the problem. Someone suggested that maybe the animal control officer could do it.

The strip of lawn to the east is school property, Chief Lockhart noted, and not part of the park.

The city doesn't have an active animal control officer. Ads have been run to hire a new one, said City Administrator Gary Shike but there wasn't much interest.

Dr. Anderson suggested they advertise again.

# City signs papers

The Oberlin City Council signed three agreements to get the sewer treatment project started, replacing the present mechanical plant with discharging lagoons.

The council first signed an engineering service agreement for Miller and Associates for the project. City Attorney Steve Hirsch said he reviewed it and the only concern he had was one part that included a fee which covered a set number of days. Thaniel Monaco, with Miller and Associates, said it is for 240 consecutive calendar days.

For the water project, Mr. Hirsch said, there was a problem with that part of the contract. Mr. Monaco said the day part will be taken care of in the construction contract.

The council approved the agreement.

The council approved papers to ask for \$2.95 million from the state revolving loan fund for the sewer project. Mr. Monaco said the city would then need the \$400,000 from a Community Block Development Grant, which would give them the total needed.

The council authorized Mayor Ken Shobe to sign an application for a grant administrator for the Community Block Development Grant.

Councilman Jay Anderson asked if the water from the discharging lagoon could be piped to Sappa Park for a wetlands. Yes, said Mr. Monaco. If the water is to be used for recreational purposes, he added, the city would have to treat it.

What would the cost be? Dr. Anderson asked.

The city would have to put in a lift station, said Mr. Monaco. It would probably be around \$100,000 for the pipe and \$75,000 to \$100,000 for a lift station and then the ultraviolet system to treat the water. A lift station is needed because it can't be gravity fed that far. There would need to be some pressure on it.

"We lost water rights out there some time ago," said Dr. Anderson. " I would hate to lose this water,
