

Anyone who doesn't win one of the big prizes in this year's *Christmas on Us* drawing will have a second chance, thanks to the Oberlin Business Alliance.

The alliance will hold "second chance" drawings Tuesday, Dec. 21, Wednesday, Dec. 22, Thursday, Dec. 23 and Christmas Eve.

They will use the tickets left from *The Oberlin Herald's* Christmas on Us drawing on Saturday, Dec. 18.

Ten tickets will be drawn each of the four days and taped to the win-

draw in a downtown business by 7 p.m. each night.

Whoever can match the numbers will win an instant \$50. On Christmas Eve, the numbers will be posted by noon.

The alliance plans to give away up to \$1,200 over the holiday season, including an adult drawing Monday, Dec. 20, in front of the Chamber of Commerce office. People 18 years and older can register to win \$1,000.

Ten names will be drawn, said Joe

Stanley, owner of Stanley Hardware, and each person will be given a box to open. In one of the boxes will be a certificate for \$1,000. The others will also win prizes, which haven't been determined yet. The group talked at its meeting last Wednesday about giving away turkeys and hams.

There will be a kids prize also. The winner, 17 or younger, will receive 24 free movies at Sunflower Cinema.

In other business, alliance mem-

bers:

- Agreed to do the same advertising as last year, but also include the television station in Goodland. The group agreed to add \$120 to the advertising budget to cover the ads at the station.

- Heard that the Chamber's annual Business to Business Tour will be held at 4 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 14. The tour gives businesses a chance to show their wares to other business owners and employees around town.

Council says job well done to pool group

The Oberlin City Council commended the pool commission Thursday for its work so far on researching what needs to be done with the city pool.

The commission is still accepting surveys from people to see what they want done with the pool.

Councilman Jay Anderson said a commission member was at the Rotary Club meeting last week. He said

the number of surveys returned in which people said they wanted a new pool was overwhelming. Currently they are doing a painting giveaway as a fund-raiser.

The commission has been working hard, he said, and could face burn out.

What about grants to help pay for the project? asked Councilman Patrick Pomeroy. The commission

met with Duane Cheney from the Western Prairie Resource Conservation and Development Area, he said.

"They showed pictures of the swimming pool," said Dr. Anderson, "and it doesn't even look safe (when it's) dry."

In other business, the council:

- Heard that the engineering process for redrilling Well No. 9 is un-

derway, and the final touches are being put on the designs.

- Signed contracts with the Kansas Department of Transportation geometric improvement of the U.S. 36-U.S. 83 junction.

- Requested a report from sexton Nan Stanley on the cemetery.

- Held a 10-minute closed session for non-elected personnel. There was no action taken.

Director asks for uniforms for volunteers

The Decatur County ambulance director asked county commissioners last week if he could buy uniforms for ambulance volunteers from memorial money.

Director Patrick Pomeroy said the

total for the uniforms would be around \$1,600. County Clerk Marilyn Horn said there is \$1,800 in the fund.

Mr. Pomeroy said he didn't want to spend all the money, so he would

go back and talk with the volunteers.

Commissioner Ralph Unger suggested that the volunteers who go on the most runs should get to spend more. Mr. Unger noted that some of the volunteers already have jackets.

The commissioners did approve Mr. Pomeroy buying 12 training tapes for \$690.

The state called, said Mr. Pomeroy, and said officials would be in Oberlin today to inspect the service. There are a few items that need to be finished, he said.

The first responder class started with four people. Mr. Pomeroy said he thought he would end up with six once things get going.
