## Learn how to remake soft jellies

Last week remaking stiff jellies was the food preservation topic, but many people have the exact opposite problem, so this week remaking soft jellies will be the subject.

Measure jelly to be recooked. Work with no more than 4 to 6 cups To remake with powdered pectin:

For each quart of jelly, mix 1/4 cup sugar, 1/2 cup water, 2 tablespoons bottled lemon juice, and 4 teaspoons powdered pectin. Bring to a boil while stirring. Add jelly and

bring to a rolling boil over high heat, stirring constantly. Boil hard 1/2 minute. Remove

from heat. Quickly skim foam off jelly and fill sterile jars, leaving 1/ 4-inch head space. Process in a boiling-water canner using the standard hot pack method in half-pint or pint jars for 10 minutes at an altitude of 1,001-6,000 feet.

To remake with liquid pectin:

For each quart of jelly, measure 3/ 4 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons bottled lemon juice, and 2 tablespoons liquid pectin. Bring to a full rolling boil, stirring constantly. Boil hard for one minute. Quickly skim off foam and fill sterile jars, leaving 1/ 4-inch head space. Adjust new lids and process the same way you remake jelly with powdered pectin shown above.

To remake without added pectin: For each quart of jelly, add 2 tablespoons bottled lemon juice. Heat to boiling and boil for 3 to 4 minutes. To determine when the jelly is done, the temperature test is the most dependable. Take the temperature of the jelly with a candy or jelly thermometer. When done, the temperature of the ielly should be 220 degrees Fahrenheit. For each 1000 feet of altitude above sea level, subtract two degrees. For instance, at 1000 feet altitude, the jelly is done
