### Pilot dies **Tuesday** in Wichita

Devil fever

A Wilsonville, Neb., spray pilot who suffered extensive burns in a July crash died Tuesday, Oct. 12, at a Wichita hospital.

Dennis Clark Kasson, 52, was at Via Christi-St. Francis Medical Center in Wichita the last three months after being rushed there by air ambulance after his spray plane crashed on July 15.

Mr. Kasson, with third-degree burns that covered 60 percent of his body, was in the hospital's burn center. He had undergone many skin grafts and was kept in the intensive

The Federal Aviation Administration is investigating to find out what caused the accident.

The plane Mr. Kasson was piloting crashed in a field near two miles north of U.S. 36 at the intersection of road W2 and J. After hitting the ground, the plane hit a power pole

The aircraft caught fire, burning Mr. Kasson. He was taken to the Norton County Hospital by Leroy Lang, and from there, he was flown to Via Christi.

When the Norton County Sheriff's Department arrived, the plane was burning and Norton Fire and Rescue was trying to put it out. A search was started to find Mr. Kasson, and then a call came that he had been taken to the hospital by private vehicle.

Mr. Kasson was a farmer in the Wilsonville. He was born Sept. 22, 1951, in Norton, the son of Curtis and Evelyn "Bobbie" (Meyers) Kasson, and grew up southeast of Wilsonville on the family farm. He attended school in Wilsonville, graduating from high school in 1970, and attended Central Nebraska Technical College at

He married Mary Margaret "Sandi" Harr on Oct. 1, 1971 in Wilsonville and they made their home on the farm.

He was a former member of the Lower Republican Resource District, and a member of the Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association and Floyd's Wednesdays Social Club. He enjoyed cars and planes.

Survivors include his wife, of the home; a son, Mathew (Jennifer) Kasson, Norcatur; a daughter, Melissa and Bradley Uehlin, Danbury; his parents, Norcatur; a brother, Michael and Moni Kasson, Morrow, Ga.; his mother-in-law, Mary Ann John Aranahoe Neb and four grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by an infant brother, James Wynn Kasson. Funeral services were Friday at the Wilsonville School. Kirk Kasson officiated and burial was in



operated the business for 20 years in cash flow. The company has a plan Oberlin, but decided to move the business out of a smaller office facility and worked with the Oberlin-Decatur County Economic Development Corp. to buy land on U.S.

Connie Grafel, marketing director for the agency, said they have an agreement for 5.6 acres of land to the east of U.S. 83 across from the city airport. At first, said Ms. Grafel, the expanding company tried to go through the Western Resource Conservation and Development office in Colby for financing. The agency was doing a project with the U.S. Rural Development Administration to do a revolving loan fund. She said they could tell it was going to take months instead of weeks to get any money so a person in Colby suggested the company through Rural Telephone revolving loan fund.
