Christine Johnson Hayes

Harriet Christine Johnson Hayes, 70, sister of Alvin S. Johnson of Oberlin, died Oct. 18, 2004, at St. Alphonsus Hospital of Boise, Idaho.

She was born Dec. 9, 1933, at Kanona, the daughter of Alvin Adolph and Frances (Sheldon) Johnson. She grew up on the family farm and graduated from Decatur Community High School in Oberlin in 1951. While in high school she edited the *Decatur Dictator*, was active in Y-Teens and was also a 4-H member. She earned a Bachelor of Science in home economics and child welfare from Kansas State University in 1955.

She married William Hayes on June 23, 1955, at Fort Riley, then they went to Germany, where he was stationed with the U.S. Army. Their daughter, Sheri Lyn Hayes, was born in Wurzburg, West Germany, on June 11, 1956. They returned to the United States in 1958, and their son, Mark Alvin Hayes, was born in Fort Hood, Texas, on June 2, 1958. She earned a Bachelor

of Science in elementary education from Fort Hays State College in 1961.

In 1966, the family moved to Boise, where she taught elementary school for 35 years. She taught two years in Kansas, one in Denver, and three in Kokomo, Ind. The remaining 29 were spent at Jackson Elementary School in Boise. She retired from teaching in 1995 but still worked as a volunteer. Her contribution to the school was recognized in 2000 when she was honored as "A Friend of Education" by the Boise Education Association.

Survivors include a daughter, Sheri Hayes, Stanton, Calif.; a son, Mark and Kathy Geier-Hayes, and a granddaughter, Lydia Hayes, all of Boise; a sister, Elizabeth and Gib Dean, Knoxville, Iowa; two brothers, Alvin S. and Sharon Johnson, Oberlin, and Eldon and Cindy Johnson, Costry, Tenn.

She was preceded in death by her husband, and her parents.

A celebration of her life will be held at 9:30 a.m. on Friday at Jackson Elementary School gymnasium. Following the service, there will be a ceremony to rename the school library in her honor. A private service will be held later near the family farm at Kanona.
