## Newsletters kept servicemen up to date on hometown news

**By MARY LOU OLSON** Decatur County men and women who served in World War II kept abreast of the happenings at home through the efforts of Marian Cathcart, who compiled a monthly newsletter that was mailed all over the world.

She was secretary at Decatur Community High School from 1925-1944. Postage was paid by the school and at one time, she mailed newsletters to over 600 servicemen and women.

Miss Cathcart, who was an aunt of Ethel Railsback and Joy Votapka of Oberlin, spent the last Sunday of each month typing up the letter, which was then mimeographed. After she left the school in 1944, Laurene (Shaw) Bryan, who worked at The Oberlin Herald, took over the job of writing and mailing the newsletter until the end of the war.

A story in The Oberlin Herald in April 1942 told of the beginning of the project.

"A monthly mimeographed newsletter to the boys in military service is being planned by the office of the Decatur Community High School," the paper reported. "It will be edited by Miss Marian Cathcart.

"The date of issue will be the 10th of each month. If this newsletter is to be a success, there must be assistance from the families of boys in service by furnishing the correct mailing addresses."

The goal was to furnish "News about you and your friends, about Decatur Community High School and Decatur County." Miss Cathcart said in a story published later that the publication started soon after the tornado which struck near Oberlin in the spring of 1942, one of the largest to ever hit Kansas. The last Sunday of the month, she spent much of the day at the school office compiling the newsletters.

"It wasn't a professional job," she said later, "just put together as best I could to save space. All too often there was bad news — a serviceman missing in action or killed, but it had to be included in the best way possible, and that was difficult."

Years later, she said she could remember many of those former students who failed to return from military service.
