Test plots give corn information By the Norcatur News Committee Over the next couple of months, I will write about the performance

tests for corn, grain sorghum, soybean, and sunflowers conducted at the K-State Experiment Stations around the area.

This week, the topic is dryland corn yields. As you can see from the results, yields were fairly respect-

At Colby, DeKalb DKC50-20R/ YGB had the high yield at 85.9 bushels per acre. The rest of the top five were DeKalb DKC52-47R/ YGB at 81.6, Pioneer 33B55 at 81.4. Pioneer 34H32 at 80.3. and Fontanelle 7R418 at 75.2 with an LSD (see below) (0.05) at 14.7. There were 16 hybrids in the test

that produced an average yield of 64.0. The test was planted no-till into wheat stubble on May 3 at 19,000 seeds per acre. Conditions were conducive to good growth in May, June, and July, but gave way to dry weather in August, which was typical for much of the area. At Hays, NC+ 4823B had the

high yield at 108.3 with Warner 4602B at 106.2, Pioneer 34H32 at 104.1, and DeKalb DKC50-20R/ YGB at 102.6 following. There were 14 hybrids planted

92 with an LSD (0.05) at 18.8. The test area received favorable precipitation in June and July, with July and August having cooler-thannormal temperatures. Farmers should use results from


