# **Results are inforirrigated crops**

Growing conditions this summer for corn were the best the area has seen for a few years.

July and August did not have the regularly 100-degrees-plus days that can cause pollen sterility and increase water use. Most fields had just enough help from Mother Nature that the corn did not become stressed for water.

Corn yields were exceptional at the experiment station in Colby and good at Tribune. Irrigated grain sorghum also did fairly well at Colby.

The 55 hybrids in the irrigated corn performance test at Colby averaged 272 bushels per acre with a least significant difference of 22. The top-yielding hybrids were LG Seeds LG2619BT and Agsource 7783 CB with 304. Other notable hybrids were Garst 8377YG1/RR at 302, Warner 4602B and Ottilie 5334YGCB at 298, Renze 8394YGCB at 295, and Triumph 1536CBRR at 294. The study was planted on May 3 on ground where sunflowers were grown the previous year with a final population of 35,100 plants per acre.

At Tribune, the irrigated corn performance test had 50 hybrids averaging 234 bushels per acre, with a least significant difference of 30. The top hybrid was Warner 4602B at 283 with the rest of the top five comprising LG Seeds LG2619BT/RR at 275, Renze 8454YGCB at 272, Fontanelle HC-7951YGCB at 271, and Fontanelle HC-7971YGCB at 270. The study was planted on May 5 on ground where grain sorghum was grown the previous year with a final population of 32,700 plants per acre.

At Colby, grain sorghum in the irrigated performance test had delayed heading and maturation during the summer due to the cool tem-



peratures in July and August. However, the grain was able to continue to fill until a frost in early November. The top-yielding hybrid was Croplan Genetics 514 at 175, with the 29 entered hybrids averaging 154. Other top hybrids were Seed Source SR 510 at 172, Pioneer 85G01 at 169, Asgrow A567 at 166, and Pioneer 84G62 at 165 bushels per acre. The test was planted on May 26 on ground that previously had soybeans with a final stand of 72,000 plants per acre.

### **'Better Than I Deserve'** By Pastor Glenn A. Krebs, United Methodist churches in Jennings and Dresden

When I ran into an old friend last week, he and I exchanged the typical greeting: "Hey, how ya doin'?" His reply was one that I hear often: "Probably better than I deserve."

I don't know if he realized the theological truth in that answer.

Psalms 103:10 reads: [God] "... does not deal with us according to our sins nor repay us according to our iniquities." (New Revised Standard Version)

I wonder how many of us realize the immensity of the good news that verse brings us. How often have you heard someone in trouble wonder aloud, "What did I do to deserve this?" How often has that someone been you?

And how often has someone asked that question, not in the context of something bad happening, but rather in the context of a special blessing from God? Most of us at one time or another have wondered if an undesirable event or situation is a payback from God for displeasing Him. But how many of us happily accept a special blessing - recovery from illness or a financial windfall or something similar

--- without asking, "What did I do to deserve this?"

If our view of life includes belief in some divine system of rewards for righteous behavior and punishment for unrighteous behavior, we will probably become confused on a regular basis. Bad stuff happens to good people just about as often as good stuff happens to bad people. The point is, stuff happens to everyone.

So I would suggest a different view. Rather than blaming God for the rotten stuff (looking at it as punishment), or even giving God credit for the great stuff (looking at it as a reward), we should look at everything simply as a natural part of the way God created the universe to operate. And the operation of the universe is affected by the choices that you and I make minute by minute and day by day in our relationships with other people.
