Council studies projects The Oberlin City Council re-

ceived a draft copy of a project board for city projects Thursday, Nov. 18, put together by Miller and Associates, the McCook engineering firm that works with the city.

Councilman Jay Anderson said they could possibly put a larger version of it in one of the empty storefronts downtown. Councilman Joe Stanley added that they might put a note on it showing whether the projects were on schedule.

At the request of the council, City Foreman Dan Castle checked into milling streets to reduce the crown which builds up with annual sealing. He said basically it comes down to what is underneath as to whether the streets can be milled and repaved with a lower crown. They also need to take into consideration the condition of the streets now.

Unless the city wants to change the gutters, he said, they are restricted by the elevation.

The only way to know if a street has a good base and can be milled is to take core samples, he said, or bring in a back hoe and tear up part of the street.

The council talked about purchasing a milling machine.

Townships get officers

The Decatur County commissioners approved nominations for trustees for Olive and Roosevelt townships at their meeting Tuesday, Nov. 16.

In both cases, there was no one on

the ballot for the election but two men received one write-in vote each. Brian Simonsson received one vote in Olive Township and Elden Long, one in Roosevelt Township.

The commissioners received a road-closing petition for a road between sections 2 and 3 in Roosevelt Township.

A hearing will be held on the request on next Tuesday.

Commissioners handed out election certificates to officials even though most won't be sworn in until January. Treasurer Jean Hale won't be sworn in until October.
