Low bid accepted for pipe

The Oberlin City Council accepted the lowest bid out of eight Thursday to use grant money to put a water main extension into the industrial park north of town on U.S.

The city received a grant from the United States Department of Agriculture for over \$90,000 for the work. The lowest bid came in around \$36,000 under the grant.

Bids ranged from \$62,132 to \$108,000. From highest to lowest the bids were from Elk Creek Backhoe and Trenching for \$62,132, Midlands Contracting for \$73,675, BSB Construction for \$77,986, Starostka Group Unlimited for \$81, 400, Interstate Irrigation for \$84,066, Morris Plumbing Plus for \$84,860, Van Kirk Bros. Contracting for \$91,195 and The Diamond Engineering Company for \$108,746.

David Blaugh with Miller and Associates said two of the bids were adjusted for mathematical errors. He said the engineering firm has worked with the low bidder before and their recommendation is to accept the bid from Elk Creek Backhoe and Trenching.

Mayor Ken Shobe asked why there was such a difference in price since they were all bidding the same thing. Mr. Blaugh said he thought it was because of the price of pipe is a lot higher in the higher bids.

Did they get good results before when the firm worked with the company? asked Councilman Jay Anderson. Did they finish on time?

Yes, to both, said Mr. Blaugh. Mr. Shike said they have been working on the estimate of \$104,000 for the project, and the grant was going to cover most of it. Mr. Blaugh said engineer Thaniel Monaco was going to see if there is a way to use the other grant money for something else. It is a considerable amount of money. So far, said Mr. Blaugh, Mr. Monaco hadn't heard anything back.

The council awarded the job to Elk Horn Backhoe and Trenching contingent on the financing.
