Dryland sorghum results vary

Dryland grain sorghum yields varried a lot across the area.

Part of this likely came from the cooler temperatures the area received in August. Rain was spotty and growing practices played their part in determining yield.

Below are the dryland milo results from the K-State test plots at Colby, Tribune and Hays.

At Colby, the grain sorghum performance test was planted on May 27 with a final stand of 24,750 plants per acre. The test average for the 33 hybrids was 50 bushels per acre with a least significant difference of 9. The top-yielding hybrids were Garst 5750, Sorghum Partners KS 310, and DeKalb DKS37-07, all at 62 bushels per acre. Other top hybrids
