

Math-a-thon raises money for St. Jude's

The math exercises are voluntary, and this is the first time the Oberlin seventh and eighth graders have participated in the event. More than 53,000 schools have taken part in this activity over the last 25 years. Results show that almost ten million pated raised at least \$35. students have benefited from this experience.

To participate in the activity, students first had to get permission from their parents, and then on their own time, the kids either worked in a workbook or on a computer disk that was appropriate for their grade level.


