Buyers make their first mistake if they select a harvested evergreen that is dehydrated and already a fire hazard. With some help, cut trees can remain hydrated for weeks, but they often come from farms far from the lot.

Watch for these signs that a tree is "too far gone":

• The needles are grayish-green, dull looking (which can be hard to determine if they've been treated to make them look greener, or are snow-covered).

• The needles feel stiff and brittle. • The needles pull easily from the tree.

• When wrapped around a finger, the needles break, rather than bend. • When torn apart and squeezed,

needles do not ooze pitch.

As soon as you get your tree home, immediately place it in a container of warm water.

Tree location is the next step. Keep the tree as cool as possible. Avoid areas that will result in rapid moisture loss.

You should keep the tree three or more feet away from candles.

Make sure you've got the newer tree lights which don't become warm. Still, make it a rule to never leave the tree unattended while



lighted. Research has found no evidence that adding aspirin, copper pennies, soda pop, sugar or bleach to the water reservoir will prolong a tree's life.

Be sure the reservoir stays filled. When a cut tree finally dries out, it must leave the house immediately. Unfortunately, needle drop isn't always the best gauge for judging when holiday decor must go. You should judge dryness by the same factors used when buying a tree.
