Board puts off decision on walk

The Oberlin School Board revisited a proposal made two months ago by a grade-school parent to put in two sidewalks outside the kindergarten building, but decided to form a playground committee and turn the issue over to it.

Shanna Long asked the board in October to install sidewalks across the street to the west of the kindergarten building, along Elm street, and on the east side of Cass Avenue outside the building and to the north. She said the pavement would give

kids a place to walk other than in the mud or in the street, and provide more area for parents to use to drop off or pick up kids.

Since the proposal was made, teacher Carol Brown now walks the kindergartners over to Rodehaver Avenue, just outside of the playground, so parents can pick them up there.

Principal Duane Dorshorst said this was working better than what they were doing in the past, but still isn't as good as it should be. There are still kids having to walk in be-

tween cars to get to their parents' car, he said.

Mr. Dorshorst said they need to deal with a crack in the playground. He suggested putting together a committee which would plan improvements and make a decision about the sidewalks.

Another idea, he said, would be to make Cass and Rodehaver one-way streets on either side of the school. That way, there wouldn't be cars going both ways.

Mrs. Long said she supports the plan for one-way streets since they are so narrow.

Mr. Dorshorst recommended that they keep dismissing the kindergartners on the east side, and then come to the board in the spring or summer at the latest with a plan on the playground and sidewalks. He said he wanted the committee to have teachers, site council members and Support our Schools members on it. around 10 people.

Board President Dewayne Jackson asked if Mrs. Long would be interested in working on the committee. She said she would.

County may ask for dispatch grant

The Decatur County commissioners talked with the Chief Dispatcher Jeanne Pachner on Tuesday about applying for an E911 grant from the state.

Ms. Pachner said they could use the \$70,000 for new equipment for the dispatch center. Deadline is Friday, Jan. 14. She said she talked with Shayla Williby, who has written two grant proposals for the sheriff's office, about writing this one.

Ms. Pachner said if they apply for the grant, then the county won't be able to receive the E911 tax on cell phones, which is 25 cents per line each month. The county has collected almost \$5,000 from the tax, she said.

Noxious Weed Director Gaylen Huntley said he took the Taurus to Wagner Ford in McCook to have the heating and cooling system checked. The heater on the car wouldn't work unless the fan was on high. One part was fixed on warranty, but Mr. Huntley said he wasn't sure if this work would be covered or not.

The Decatur County commissioners met behind closed doors to talk about real property acquisition at their meeting last Tuesday at the request of Ambulance Director Patrick Pomeroy.

The commissioners, Mr. Pomeroy, County Clerk Marilyn Horn and County Attorney Steve Hirsch met for 10 minutes about the topic. There was no action taken.

Commissioners received two bids for a water heater at the ambulance barn which were opened in the meeting. The first bid came from Bob's Plumbing of Oberlin for a White hot water heater for \$320, with labor costing \$41, for a total of \$361.

The second bid came from Hansen's Heating and Plumbing for a Miser 40-gallon heater for \$356, including installation.

Mr. Pomeroy said these were the only two businesses that showed interest. Workers from both came to the ambulance barn.

The commissioners approved the low bid from Hansen's.

Mr. Pomeroy said a representative from Nex-Tech would be there on Wednesday to program radios and repair loose batteries.

He requested a closed session for five minutes for non-elected personnel. There was no action taken.
