## Landfill to get gravel County will buy rock for entrance

Decatur County commissioners agreed to buy crushed rock for the drive into the landfill and supplies to build more catch screens to stop trash from blowing at their meeting last Tuesday.

Road and Bridge Supervisor Tim Stallman said there was money in the landfill budget to buy some rock to put on the drive. He said it is important to keep the drive nice so people could get there easily. The rock costs around \$300 a load, and he said they could use up to five loads.

Mr. Stallman said he would also like to build more screens to catch trash as it is being buried at the landfill.

Mr. Stallman said Liberty Township would like to rent the county's packer for road work. A company called Whirlwind will be doing the

Commissioners agreed that the company could rent the machine at \$40 a day. They said that although companies can rent the equipment, private rental is not allowed.

Mr. Stallman said the packer at the fairgrounds doesn't have a trailer, so the contractor will have find a way to get to the job site.

In other business, the commissioners:

• Heard that the state Department of Health and Environment had inspected the landfill last week and it passed. Mr. Stallman said he received a phone call from the inspector, who praised the work of landfill operator Glen Strong.

• Held a road closing hearing for Beaver Township. With no one to protest, the commissioners approved closing the road between sections 9 and 10.

## Gigantic blades stop here

**By KIMBERLY DAVIS** Three large flatbed trucks pulled through town just before Christmas, carrying three more blades for a wind farm being built in Texas.

The blades, hauled on flatbed semi-trailer trucks, have been coming through town for several weeks now. The drivers say they usually take a break here, parking at the old police station at the intersection of U.S. 36 and U.S. 83.

The blades are being hauled from Grand Forks, N.D., to Sweet water, Texas, for a new wind generating facility.

Heath Utter of Wisconsin, one of the drivers with B&K Trucking hauling the blades, said there will be hundreds of blades coming through Oberlin.

The towers for the wind farm are also being hauled over the road, but not with the same trucking company, and he didn't think they would come through Oberlin.


