During the three months ending Dec. 31, 1879, 380 registered letters were sent from the Oberlin post office.

Wm. A. Hollowell has been appointed postmaster at this place in place of J.B. Hitchcock, who resigned, and will begin his duties in about two weeks. Mr. Hitchcock has given general satisfaction since he has been postmaster and a great many regret his going out.
