To the Editor:

This is in reply to the column, "Litterbugs abuse Sappa Park," in the Jan. 5 issue of The Oberlin Herald. I wish to inform you why conditions at Sappa Park are what they

For several years, my wife and I made several trips a week to Sappa Park, and each time when we entered the park, we picked up trash from the roadway all the way to the shelter house and then put it in the dumpster. Most of the time, the dumpster was so full of non-park trash, there was no room for the trash we had collected and no room for trash people had to dispose of when they used the park.

On April 9, 1999, I sent a letter to the city administrator about the trash problem at Sappa Park. We were expecting help from the city in controlling non park trash being dumped at Sappa Park. We received none. Enclosed you will find a copy of my letter sent to the city administrator and a copy of the reply.

Sappa Park became a place to dispose of anything you wanted to get rid of without paying a dumping fee.

Two years ago, I made a drive to pick up trash thrown over the fences along the Sappa Park roadway. When the drive was completed, the dumpster was half full of trash plus I had four automobile tires.
