Boys take third at invitational

The Decatur Community High boys took third in the annual Oberlin Invitational Tournament last week, defeating Resurrection Christian and Cambridge, Neb., but falling to

Oberlin took third; Cambridge, fourth; Hoxie, fifth; St. Francis, sixth; Rawlins County, seventh; and

Resurrection, eighth. In the first game on Thursday, the Oberlin boys beat Resurrection,

very good. Andy Inman really contributed tonight with 13 points and five assists," Coach Dick Ahlberg said. "Our balanced scoring was a positive. Jason Thomas was very active tonight with nine rebounds and four steals."

The game started out even, with both teams scoring 19 points in the first quarter. Then Oberlin opened up, outscoring Resurrection 18-7 in 59. the second, 14-12 in the third and 17-13 in the fourth quarter.

Both teams had lots of rebounds. Oberlin had 37 and Resurrection 41, including 21 on missed Oberlin shots, Coach Ahlberg said.

Resurrection had 27 turnovers while Oberlin only had 16.
