# **Seminarsavailable for farmers**

Farmers and ag workers have an upcoming opportunity to attend an in-depth management school for either soils and nutrients or insects and diseases

The soils and nutrient management school will be held at the Hoxie 4-H building from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Tuesday. Dale Leikam, Kansas State University nutrient management specialist, will discuss soil cation exchange capacity, nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, and secondary nutrient management and with fertility recommendations from K-State. Continuing education credits will be available for certified crop advisors.

The ost is \$25, which will be collected at the door. Registration includes lunch and a notebook on soil and nutrient management. Make a reservation by 10 a.m. Monday at (785) 462-6281. Eight are needed to have the school.

There will be insect and disease management schools from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 24, at the Norton 4-H building or Friday, Feb. 25, at the Grainfield 4-H building.

Phil Sloderbeck and J.P. Michaud, K-State entomologist, will discuss insect management in corn, grain sorghum, sunflowers, alfalfa and wheat. Jim Stack, K-State plant pathologist, will discuss disease management in soybean, corn, grain sorghum, sunflower and wheat. Commercial pesticide applicators can receive 6.5 continuing education credits, and credits will be available for certified crop advisors.


