Wheat crop may need nitrogen

When farmers look across their wheat fields this spring, they see good stands with the potential for a Moisture over the winter has been

enough to carry wheat through, while air temperatures have not been bitterly cold. All of this has led some farmers to have, dare I say, optimism about their crop. However, there is plenty that can

go wrong from now until harvest and in that respect, it is important for farmers to control the variables that could limit potential wheat yield. One of these is nitrogen.

In the past during this time of year, I have written about top dressing wheat, and every year, I see farmers top dressing their wheat too late to do them any good.

Wheat needs to have nitrogen a minimum of two to three weeks before it starts jointing.

In this two- to three-week period, nitrogen will have a chance to move application nitrogen is delayed, the lier. farmer will not see the yield increase anticipated. Instead, the wheat will likely have a higher protein content.


