• Commented they still haven't received a bill for the Fourth of July fireworks. The group hasn't been billed for the fireworks in a few



Man arrested for drugs

Just like in the song "Alice's Restaurant," a letter under a pile of trash got an Oberlin youth in a pile of trouble.

Decatur County Undersheriff Michael French arrested a 19-yearold Oberlin man last week after a complaint about trash dumped 10 miles east and four miles north of town.

Undersheriff French said the call came into dispatch on Saturday, Feb. 26. He was out of town, so last Tuesday, he checked the site out and found several pieces of mail belonging to Adam Miller. Also in the trash were several pieces of drug paraphernalia, including homemade pipes and bongs.

He said he took photos of the site and then confronted Mr. Miller, who denied that the trash was his.

Undersheriff French said he took the information to Judge John Bremer, who issued a search warrant for Mr. Miller's house in Oberlin.

That afternoon, he searched the house, finding Mr. Miller asleep. Undersheriff French said he found a quarter of an ounce of marijuana on Mr. Miller and a smoking device. The offenses are misdemeanors, but Mr. Miller was arrested and taken to jail.

Undersheriff French said he went back to the house and found several other pieces of drug paraphernalia.

Mr. Miller spent a night in jail on one count of possessing drugs, one count of possessing drug paraphernalia-and one of littering. He was released last Wednesday on a \$2,500 bond.

He was supposed to enter his plea on Monday, but his lawyer, Mark Whitney, filed for a continuance.


