Five boys born within three days kept doctors busy

"Boy, Oh Boy, Oh Boy, Oh Boy, Oh Boy" was the big news in *The Oberlin Herald* 50 years ago, when five boys were delivered in three days by Dr. Donald McCoy or Dr. Jim Coffman at the Decatur County Hospital.

First to arrive was Lee Don Scott, who was born March 26, 1955, and tipped the scales at 6 pounds, to Don and Alene Scott of Oberlin.

The next three shared March 28 birthdays: Larry Bearley, son of John and Nora Bearley of Oberlin, at 7 pounds; Richard Anderson, son of Elden and Detta Anderson of rural Oberlin, 6 pounds, 10 ounces; and Larry Van Vleet, son of Kenneth and Henrietta Van Vleet of rural Lebanon, Neb., who tipped the scale at 7 pounds, 8 1/2 ounces.

The last of the five was Rod Steinmetz, son of Samme and Delpha Steinmetz, who arrived on March 29 to take his place in the nursery.

Fathers of all the boys were farmers at the time, with the exception of Larry Bearley, whose dad was principal at Oberlin Elementary School. They all continued to live in the area and all graduated from Decatur Community High School.

Lee Don Scott was reared on a farm northwest of Oberlin and helped his father with farm work, as well as caring for livestock.

After finishing high school, he attended junior college in Liberal. He and Melanie Sis of McCook, were married on Aug. 13, 1982, at the St. Patrick's Catholic Church in McCook.

Being the son of a farmer, Lee Don said, he chose a job in agriculture. First he worked with his parents on the farm, then became a technician for the Soil Conservation District, a job he still holds.

The Scotts still live in Oberlin with their five children, Danielle, Britton, Chanelle, Bronson and Rachelle.

Larry was the third son in the Bearley family. He has two brothers, Robert and Max, and two sisters, Sandra Allen and Montine Alstrom.

He said he learned at an early age to listen to his elders, and may have listened a little too well at times. On his first day of kindergarten, his mother walked him to and from school. On the second day, she allowed him to go by himself. She told him after school to "wait for the cars before you cross the street."

When he was late getting home, his mother went to look for him. She found him at the cross walk and asked him why he was just standing there. He explained that he was waiting for the cars and no cars had come by.

He started working for the state when he was a senior, then after high school, Kirk Brown offered him a produce job at Rave's Grocery. AF-

ter five years, he was offered a job by Mike Jones at Halliburton, his first experience driving a truck in the oil field business. He said he wound up working 24 hours a day, however, and because of that decided to apply for a job with Koch Industries. The last 10 years, he has been driving for National Cooperative Refinery Association.

He and his wife Judy live at Oakley. He said that he has come to recognize how God looks after you as you go through life. Looking back, he sees that any time he needed a change, God provided an opportunity for him to make it.

Richard Anderson attended Plainview, a one-room school near his farm home in Sappa Township, then Decatur Community High School. After earning a degree in farm and ranch management at Colby Community College, he began farming with his father. He operates some 4,000 acres and he and his father together run a cow/calf operation.

He said he married Maureen McNulty from the Denver area, the "love of his life," and they recently started a new venture — running a hunting lodge, called the Sappa Creek Lodge. He is active in the community and Herndon Covenant Church and recently was named "Outstanding Ag Builder of the Year" by the Oberlin-Decatur County Area Chamber of Commerce.

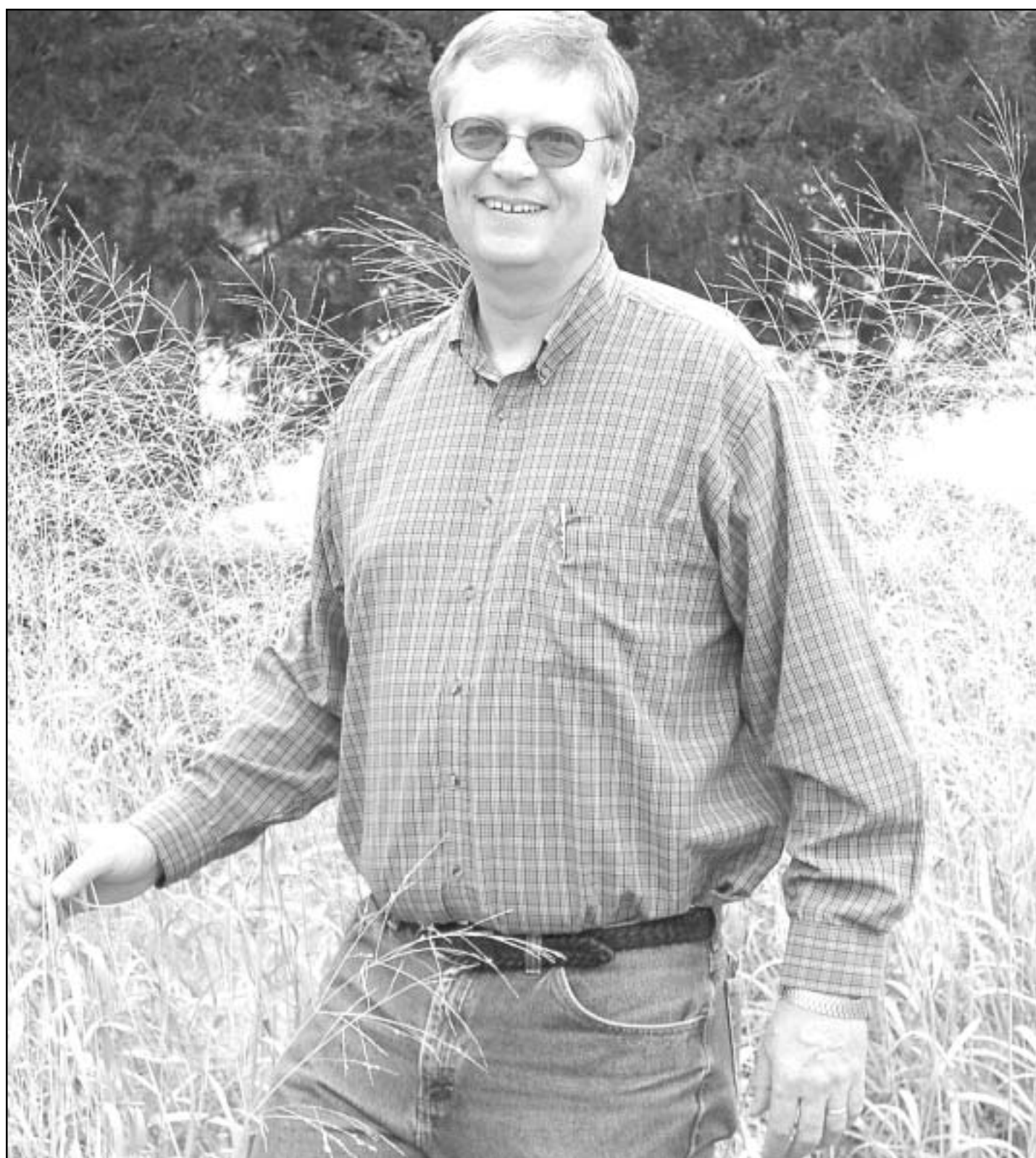
The Andersons have four children, Nicholas, 23, who will be married soon to Stephanie Reed; Samantha, 11; Christopher 9; and Gabriel 8. He has a brother, Gary Anderson, who owns and operates the LandMark Inn in Oberlin.

Larry Van Vleet attended the Star school, and after graduating from high school, he attended the University of Kansas, obtaining a Bachelor of Science in biology in 1977. He was accepted into the KU School of Medicine and received his medical doctorate degree in 1980.

After his marriage that September, he and his wife Lucinda worked at the Northwest Kansas Regional Medical Center in Goodland, where he completed an externship in family practice. He said that after some harrowing experiences delivering babies, he decided on a career in internal medicine.

He completed his residency with the University of California in Bakersfield, Calif., then returned to Kansas to work in underserved counties to fulfill his Kansas scholarship requirements.

He has worked for Kaiser Permanente in Denver since 1987, lately at Kaiser's new hospital in Lafayette, Colo., as a hospitalist. They have two daughters, Lydia, 16, and Mary, 14. Larry serves as head elder and small group coordinator. (See FIVE on Page 10B)
